The month begins with the celebration of St. Joseph the worker. We are reminded in the Litany to St. Joseph that one of his titles is "pillar of family life". Sunday May 23rd, we celebrated Pentecost. On the 50th day after Easter the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles, causing them to speak in tongues. The descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Church in Jerusalem led to the miracle of one voice being heard in many languages, an event which is both a symbolic reversal of the scattering of the human race and a pledge of the Church to gather all nations into the unity of worship of the one, only, living, and true God by accepting Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.
